Past Commander William Allsopp, JN, recently wrote a series of articles for publication in the Saginaw Bay Yacht Club's Masthead publication. With his permission, the excerpt regarding his experiences with the Saginaw Bay Sail and Power Squadron is included below.



#### **PART FIVE: SBYC & SBPS - Bonded Boaters**

Shortly after I started this series of Masthead articles, I received a letter from the United States Power Squadron (USPS) headquarters. I was again reminded of how long I have been an active boater (and how old I am) and they congratulated and thanked me for being a 50-year member. I initially thought they must be mistaken, or maybe I had become a member when I was 12. They were not mistaken. I did become involved when I was 12 when I took the boater safety class. However, I did not become a member of USPS until I was finishing college 9 years later. The local unit of USPS is the Saginaw Bay Power Squadron (SBPS), and I am very happy to have been involved with SBPS, as well as SBYC, for such a long time.

Some of you may not know what the USPS is. It is your lucky day and I am pleased to let you know. USPS was founded in 1914, through the efforts of two experienced boaters, Roger Upton and Charles F. Chapman. They had determined to establish a much-needed organization to foster safe boating and educate the public regarding safe and legal boating operations. Mr. Chapman wrote the boating "bible," still being published today, Piloting Seamanship and Small Boat Handling. I still have my copy. This nonprofit entity has grown to 45,000 members who participate in 450 local squadrons. It is organized such that each local unit is part of a geographical District, and in turn, the District reports to the National center.

The primary function of the organization is to provide education in boating through a wide range of topics. The basic boating safety course is provided free of charge to the public (small fees to cover costs) by volunteer members of the local unit. Hundreds of thousands of boaters have benefited from this service. In addition, the organization provides many other courses such as seamanship, piloting, navigation, weather, advanced electronics, cruise planning and, yes, engine maintenance (thank you Keith Anderson for letting me take it twice – I am now not *totally* inept). These advanced classes are provided by members for their fellow members.

SBYC members and SBPS share their love for the water and the joy that boating brings us. Of the 70 SBPS commanders, the majority were also SBYC members. Many members have been very active in both organizations. An example includes Craig Murchison, past Commodore of SBYC, past Commander of SBPS, and the current and longtime Chief Education officer of SBPS. He has been responsible for the excellent programs provided to the public and to SBPS

members. Another example is Guy Greve, longtime member of SBYC and a multiple-year Commander of SBPS.

SBYC and SBPS have worked together in many ways. SBYC has been host for the vast majority of dinner meetings held by SBPS. SBPS has voluntarily provided programs for SBYC including CPR classes, boat inspections, weather programs and other programs. I mentioned earlier in my articles the Predicted Log Events that were held years ago. Many of these were joint efforts open to both organizations. Boating classes have been undertaken by many SBYC members and their children, who can utilize this program to get their boating safety certificate.

Activities of SBPS are not limited to education. As mentioned, SBPS provides boat inspections by trained volunteers. SBPS members offer to conduct the inspections at the club. Additionally, SBPS provides monthly programs, often at SBYC, of topics of interest to all boaters, SBPS and SBYC alike. SBPS holds summer events, cook outs, rendezvous and other similar events, too. There are also district and national conferences which hold hospitality rooms so members can meet other like-minded members from all over the country.

I have had the great pleasure of being a SBPS Commander in 1983, following in the footsteps of my father, William E. Allsopp, who was Commander in 1974 (a former SBYC director). I think we are the only father/son Commanders. This experience helped me to correspondingly become an effective board member and Commodore of SBYC (1989 – wow that was a long time ago, too). I did not give up on SBPS and continued to be active teaching the boating class for many years, often at John Glenn High School. I also was active in both the District and National organizations serving on the law committee for each organization and serving as law officer of the local SBPS for many years (fortunately, we did not get in to too much trouble). Once you are involved in either of these organizations, it is hard to let go.

Finally, I will give you a prime example of the boating and personal bond of SBYC and SBPS. Mr. Earl Martin was a very active SBPS member for many years. He served as Commander in 1964. He was actively involved in SBPS teaching and contributing to many SBPS activities. He was often around SBYC and developed many friendships with SBYC members, including my dad, but Earl was not a SBYC member. Sadly, Earl passed away about 1980. Earl had passed along his strong desire to have his ashes scattered in his favorite place – Saginaw Bay. At that time, cremation was rare and, in fact, many discouraged it. A crew of SBYC and SBPS members determined however to grant his wish, and a boat left SBYC with the crew intent on performing the event regardless of their personal beliefs. The crew accomplished the task and drank a toast to their friend. That was a true testament to the bond shared by SBYC and SBPS members. I hope SBPS and SBYC are around for many years continuing to share their love of our favorite pastime.
